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#### Abstract

About this Course

You are holding the paperback interface of a special new GRE course. You will study with a combination of books, video lectures, and optional (highly recommended) one-on-one lessons online or in Solano County, CA. I have structured the course this way to maximize your learning, minimize your costs, and make the best use of your time! If you can commit to reading the following three pages, I'll get you ready to launch.


## Me

Hi! My name is Scot Fagerland. Nth Degree Tutoring is a one-tutor company founded on my personal skills and experience. Since I am not an agency, I can offer you my services directly and affordably, without exorbitant middle-man markups! (See my qualifications below if interested).

## You

Most students who call me have limited time and money. This course is designed to meet those demands. It's "The Course You Want" as opposed to "The Course You Need", which would be lengthier and more expensive. You can complete this course on just about any schedule or budget. Most people who call me are "returning students" who have been out of school for years. They have no GRE experience, and they are usually terrified of the math section. Most of their entrance diagnostic scores fall in the range of $140-155$ on each section (lower half to upper half, but not upper quarter). This book is aimed at those middle-ground students. If you fall outside that range, I can help you too, but this book might not be the best fit for you.

## How the Course Works

In the 2010s, I got a high volume of calls for GRE lessons, so I created an 18-hour group course. Business is much slower in the 2020s. I can't be sure why, but I blame shifting search engine algorithms, increasing competition online, and the strangely long-term impact of COVID19. With a sparser clientele, my GRE lessons are now one-on-one, and often remote. In 2022, I converted my live group class into this online course for individual study.

I find that almost all students learn better from spoken lectures than from a book. Therefore, you will watch my lectures on video and use this book for written supplements and assignments. Links to my lectures and other resources will be provided by URLs and QR codes for convenient access on your smart phone. You will find a lot of overlap between the written material and the spoken lectures. I did that deliberately so that you can keep a record of the lectures without having to take excessive notes while listening to me.

I recommend that you schedule lessons with me when you need essay feedback or get stuck on homework problems. Please use my appointment calendar at the links below. You may also schedule a free 30 -minute consultation before getting started (see "Contact Info" at the end of Lesson 1).

Finally, you will need the ETS Official Guide to the GRE. Buy that book separately (I'll link to it in Lesson 1). The ETS is the company that writes and grades the GRE. ETS materials are the only sources of "official" GRE problems. Therefore, I will assign most of my homework from the Official Guide.

## Schedule

This course will take you through the following lessons of lectures and activities:
(Note to self: THIS WILL BE REVISED AS THE COURSE PROGRESSES. I'll need to update this page and the corresponding video when the course is finished. Do not number lessons yet, on paper or videos, until numbering is finalized! This means that I either shouldn't use lesson numbers in the videos or I can't compile final drafts of any lesson videos until all numbering is finalized).

1. Introduction to the GRE and this course (we are here now!)
2. Entrance diagnostic
3. Verbal lecture and homework (Will almost certainly expand into at least three lessons)
4. Referral to Khan Academy for basic math content review
5. Introduction to GRE Math: lecture and homework
6. "Proportions and Percents 'til you Puke" lecture and homework
7. Arithmetic "Power Hour" lecture and homework
8. Algebra Power Hour lecture and homework
9. Geometry Power Hour lecture and homework
10. Data Analysis Power Hour lecture and homework
11. Analyze an Argument Essay lecture, demonstration, and homework
12. Analyze an Issue Essay lecture, demonstration, and homework
13. Test logistics, including time management and score reporting
14. Exit diagnostic

The original group course was conducted three hours a week for six weeks (plus homework). When you take this course individually, you will proceed through it at your own pace. I'd expect it to take you around 36 to 72 study-hours. I recommend you devote one to three months to it, but you could pace yourself to do this in a week or a year; it's up to you.

The only materials that you are committed to purchasing are your two books - this one and the ETS Guide. You may then choose to schedule as few or as many live lessons with me as you like. I also offer flash cards for sale, in hardcopy and online formats.

## Introduction to the GRE and this Course

## What is the GRE and where does it come from?

- Graduate Record Exam: For all graduate / professional degrees except medical.
- GRE is written and administered by the Educational Testing Service, ETS. No affiliation with any university or test-prep service. www.ETS.org
- Created in 1930's when graduate population was very small and academic, and when standardized tests were mostly used at the upper levels. The flavor of the test reflects its history.


## GRE Subjects and Scoring

The Three R's: Readin', 'Ritin', and 'Rithmetic

- Quantitative (Math): Graded from 130-170. Curved. The average student has mastery up to $4^{\text {th }}$ grade and then her proficiency steeply declines; almost no recall beyond $8^{\text {th }}$ grade.
- Verbal (Reading): Graded from 130 - 170. Curved around an average mastery of about $12^{\text {th }}$ grade level (objectively much harder!)
- (Composite score): Ranges from 260-340
- Most departments want to see an "upper half" composite score (about 300) perhaps with an "upper quarter" score (upper 150's) on one of Math or Verbal. The most selective schools will expect an "upper eighth" composite score (about 320).
- Essays: Graded from $0-6$. A bar exam (grading rubric).


## Improvement Expectations

## The Nth Degree Improvement Score

My "Improvement Score" measures your improvement in terms of scarcity. If you graduate from the course twice as scarce as when you came in, then your improvement score will be 2.

$$
I . S .=\frac{100-P_{1}}{100-P_{2}}
$$

In this formula, $\mathrm{P}_{1}$ is your entrance percentile and $\mathrm{P}_{2}$ is your exit percentile.
Ex: Stella's entrance percentile was $60^{\text {th }}$. Her exit percentile is $80^{\text {th }}$. What is her improvement score? (Each face represents $5 \%$ of her competitors).


$$
\begin{gathered}
\text { I.S. }=\frac{100-60}{100-80} \\
\text { I.S. }=2
\end{gathered}
$$

- Most students can expect an improvement score of up to 2 with a few months of hard work. Improvement has a strong plateau effect over time; you'll start improving quickly and then slow down and max out.
- An improvement score of 0 happens sometimes when students work full-time and / or put little effort into the course, or sometimes when math preparedness is extremely low. $\because$
- Improvement scores beyond 2 are possible but exceptional.


## Improvement Bands*

Assuming an improvement score of 2 (challenging but reasonable), you will move up by exactly one shaded "improvement band" on the chart below. Potentially, your improvement is unlimited. Some students raise their scores by two improvement bands! It's healthy for you to realize, though, that that kind of improvement is exceptional, especially in a short-term course.

## The Big Picture

Deeper reflections on Test Prep Philosophy for the morbidly curious.

## Content vs. Aptitude.

- The GRE is mostly a test of Lifelong Left-brained Learning Aptitudes, LLLA's.
- The math portion has content, though it is by and large a means for testing LLLA's. It's not that you will "use math" in the future. They want to know how you think and learn, and math makes great test material for that purpose:
- It's universal and standard
- The exam tests your language / reasoning skills and your ability to handle a large volume of organized information, and math involves all these traits.
- Therefore, merely being exposed to math content again is necessary but not sufficient to improve, because the whole point is that you are being tested on how you learn it.
- Expect to see an endless variety of problems that you have never literally seen before.
- The ideal GRE test-taker is
- Well-read.
- Exceptionally good at handling large volumes of organized information.
- Highly literate at written English.
- A critical, creative, evidentiary-based thinker.


## Bar vs. Curve.

- The Math and Verbal sections are graded on a curve: you against your peers. It is almost impossible to ever "ace" a test like this because:
- It is designed so that the average tester gets $50 \%$ accuracy.
- Your peers are also studying and improving.
- The ETS is aggressively expanding into new markets, which affects the curve.
- 2000's decade: Business schools (now accepted by all!)
- 2010's: Now accepted by Harvard Law School, most other law schools will probably follow!
- The writing section is a "bar" exam graded on a rubric: you against the test.
